KS2 skills encompass all 4 modalities: Speaking, Listening, Reading and Writing

Skills are acquired, revisited and developed, using increased grammar knowledge as they progress through the school.

## Year 3

- To show that he/she recognises words and phrases heard by responding appropriately
- To follow simple instructions and link pictures and actions to language
- To join in with stories, rhymes or songs

- To repeat sentences, making simple adaptations to them
- To use accurate pronunciation
- To use simple adjectives orally
- To read some familiar words using mostly accurate pronunciation
- To learn and remember new words encountered in reading
- To write simple words from memory
- To use simple adjectives to describe things in writing
- To record descriptive sentences using a word bank
- To recognise nouns, adjectives and verbs
- To understand gender
- To have a basic understanding of the usual order of words in the target language
- To identify social conventions at home and in other cultures

## Year 4

- To listen for sounds, rhyme and rhythm
- To read some familiar words and phrases aloud and pronounce them accurately
- To memorise and present a short spoken text
- To follow a short familiar text, listening and reading at the same time
- To write simple words and phrases using a model and some words from memory
- To memorise and recite a short spoken text
- To be able to sort words into dictionary order by first/second letter
- To become familiar with the layout of a simple bilingual dictionary
- To ask and answer questions on several topics

- To read and understand a range of familiar written phrases
- To ask and answer questions on several topics
- To memorise and present a short spoken text
