### Fairer Trading Discussion Cards



A family in the UK want to make a difference to the people in other countries who help provide the food in the supermarkets. They make sure they buy produce which has been traded fairly.

**Are they helping make the world a fairer place?  
How?**



A company who buys and sells the sugar from the sugar mill in Malawi carries out checks to make sure the farmer is getting paid a fair price for his sugar.

**Is this fair trading?  
Why?**



A sugar mill owner in Malawi talks to the farmer about what price he needs for his sugar so that he could run a farm which made money. The sugar mill owner then commits to paying that price.
